Project Focus—Seeking Survey Participants



Help us Field Test the New Renzulli Executive Functioning Scale



Siegle Talks at International Conference in Greece

Del Siegle, Director of the Renzulli Center for Creativity, Gifted Education, and Talent Development, delivered a keynote address at the European Council for High Ability (ECHA) conference held in Thessaloniki, Greece this August. The event drew educators, researchers, and policymakers from 40 nations, all gathering to explore approaches to gifted education and talent development.

Siegle's keynote, titled "Shifting Through the Essentials of Gifted Education for Talent Development: Separating the Wheat from the Chaff," emphasized the need to focus on three key pillars essential to fostering talent in students:

- 1. **Advanced Academic Options:** Del underscored the importance of offering advanced academic pathways to nurture and challenge high-ability students.
- 2. **Higher Level Thinking and Classroom Complexity:** In his keynote, Del highlighted the critical role of fostering deep, complex discussions in the classroom to enhance higher-order thinking skills.
- 3. **Interest-Based Authentic Learning Opportunities:** He advocated for providing students with opportunities to engage in learning that is both authentic and aligned with their personal interests (Type IIIs), driving passion and curiosity in education.

The ECHA conference serves as an international event for global leaders in the field of high ability education, providing a platform for research and collaboration.
