Project Focus - Seeking School Sites!

Project Focus, a research project at the University of Connecticut, is seeking elementary schools for participation. We are seeking classroom teachers at grades 3–5 to participate in professional learning with follow-up data collection focused on classroom discussions. The overall purpose of the project is to examine the effects of professional learning activities on teachers' self-efficacy around questioning and discourse, recognition of evidence of advanced potential, and instructional quality. Additionally, we seek to identify the linguistic features that characterize high-quality classroom questioning and discussion and use those to inform ongoing professional learning activities.
